This spring the children have been busy as usual continuing to develop space around the school and learning on many levels. We have begun planting flowers and veg for the season learning about life cycles.

Class 5 and Class 7 have been learning about camp fire safety and how to light, manage and cook marshmallows on an open fire.



We have finally buried the time capsule and learned about maps, how they work and why they are important.

Rural Skills I have been very busy and a new group, Rural Skills II led by Ollie Fuller, has begun in Key Stage 2. The children in both groups are learning the basic practical and independent skills that will enable them to access Bicton College when they leave Mill Water.

Mill Water Blooms has its first crop of daffodils and both groups are looking forward to seeing how much money they can make in our first year.

Mill Water Moorland Walkers has started during enrichment time on a Friday. This group are learning about safe walking in moorland and mountain environments and use Woodbury and surrounding common land to train. We hope to establish teams that can access events and activities such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award, Ten Tors and the Jubilee Challenge.

Bird Week has been a great success, the highlight this year being the falconry experience thanks to David Buncle, falconer to Escot Country Park.
