The mud kitchens were unveiled to Classes 1 and 2 with great excitement, and after the ribbon was cut they were used and enjoyed immediately! Tony from 'Mud Kitchens Devon' was there for the grand unveiling, and commented that it was a joy to see the kitchens in action. He said that he is normally asked to deliver to customers' homes after their children have

gone to bed so the kitchen can be a surprise birthday or Christmas present. Because of this he very rarely gets to see anyone playing with them, and found it an emotional and moving experience. The kitchens will offer both classes the chance to explore messy play and imaginative play at the same time, and have already been enjoyed hugely. School Improvement

On 28th April we were visited by Andrew Redpath, a former Ofsted inspector who now does consultancy work for Babcock and Devon County Council. Andrew's visit was extremely positive, and he highlighted the progress made over the last few months and strengths in sixth-form, the governing body, safeguarding, early years and assessment. Below are a selection of Andrew's comments:

- Considerable progress has been made in developing the sixth form since the last inspection.
- There is a strong emphasis on developing independence and applying skills in the local community.
- The governing body has been transformed with a new chair and five new members.
- Governors demonstrate a firm commitment to the school's future success.
- Individual governors bring a level of experience and skill which has enriched the governing body and helped it to have a firmer oversight of the school's work.
- Safeguarding was strong and judged good at the time of the last full inspection.
- The school has an appropriate approach to teaching children with complex needs. Structured activities are combined with child directed activities.

- A comprehensive system for setting targets and monitoring progress has been introduced.
- All staff are using the system which is helping to build a clear picture of pupils' progress over time. They record small gains in pupils' learning.

Although there are areas for improvement, Andrew's overall conclusion was that there is clear evidence for the school to be judged good in all areas, and that due to strong leadership the school demonstrates the capacity to get even better.

National Picture and Governance

You may have seen the recent news story about a father who won a court case after taking his child out of school for a holiday during term time. Although this is an interesting development, we will continue to follow current policy which means that absences in term time will only be authorised in exceptional circumstances. Attendance, related to safeguarding, is a really high priority for the school and we thank all parents and carers for their ongoing support as we implement the school's policy on this.

You may also have read in the press about the government U-turn on academisation. We will monitor the situation closely, but as the possibility of academisation is still on the horizon we will continue to work in the best interests of the school and take our time to consider all the options.

We are continuing to develop close links with Exmouth Learning Community, and at our latest meeting I was extremely impressed with Debbie Clapshaw (Devon Governance Lead) who spoke with great clarity and insight on the picture of governance nationally.

I also recently attended the SWALSS conference (the Association for Leaders in Special Education), with Maggie Carter (Chair of Governors) and Andrew Gardner (Vice Chair). Thank you to both Maggie and Andrew for showing their dedication to Mill Water by giving up weekend time to attend the conference. I was particularly impressed with Victoria Hatton, Chair of Governors at Doubletree Special School and Associate at Browne-Jacobson Solicitors, who spoke about legal issues such as complaints, allegations, school policies and procedures.
