HCPT's Easter pilgrimage to Lourdes is a life changing experience for children and helpers alike

HCPT was formed in 1956 when a young doctor, Michael Strode, took four disabled children to the shrine of Lourdes in the south of France. From the outset he insisted that the children should be treated just like other visitors to the town and should be accommodated in hotels rather than hospitals - an idea that was revolutionary.

Now, every Easter, HCPT takes over 1,000 disabled and disadvantaged children on a week long pilgrimage holiday. The children are joined by volunteer helpers. The children and helpers come from all walks of life and may belong to any religious background, or none at all. Everyone travels in small groups from all over the UK and beyond.

The aim is to give the children a safe, fun, meaningful and enjoyable holiday. A stay

will typically feature visits to the Lourdes Grotto, outings to local attractions, cafés, and trips to the mountains or seaside.





HCPT is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, young people and vulnerable adults. It expects all of its trustees, volunteer helpers and staff to share this commitment.

HCPT regards preparation as a key part of the trip. Children come as part of a locally organised group which has a Group Leader. The leader arranges meetings between helpers, the children and their parents, so they all have the chance to get to know each other before the pilgrimage. Regular home visits ensure that the children get to know and have confidence in their helpers.

Care

The children are assisted by volunteer helpers, many of whom are young people. Doctors, nurses and chaplains also travel to give specialist support. Group Leaders are all previous helpers with a track record in caring for disabled children. All volunteer helpers are carefully vetted, undergoing an interview and reference process, as well as Enhanced DBS checks or PVG scheme memberships. Children receive the highest level of care and attention while away from home.

During Easter HCPT has its own medical organisation in Lourdes which has close links with the local medical services in order to provide a comprehensive service in case of need.
